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I just took it yesterday. If you can't focus and feel you're bored, at least look at tables and try to study those. I'm taking it this weekend and I'm just a bag of nerves. This might require you to organize them, review all of the important points and re-read portions of the textbook. I was like there is no way I will be able to wait two months for the results, but eventually (days later) I stopped thinking about it. There's actually a wealth of flashcards on there already that you can use to quiz yourself for both BCPS and BCACP. Must be done on letterhead from your employer. Cramming might seem appealing, but it can be stressful and not as effective as a thought-out schedule. A LOT of information though. I've now accepted the fact that the test HAS to be as random as it was....even though I felt like my particular test had a 'theme'..but I've heard others had different 'themes'. I pivoted and started using HYMR as my main source of studying. Was thinking of making a study group? It also allows you to study smarter, and gives you more confidence when it comes time to take the exam! It is not to early to start preparing! If you are looking for further premium materials to help your BCACP all access pass (save \$100 versus buying two 6 month access periods). I need another couple days to get HR to sign documents for me. I took exam 1 but can't quite guage how I did... The lectures are somewhat information overload. 4. Hospital inpatient pharmacy 2016-2020. Prob got 1-2 questions wrong on stats if that. Learning the regulations was tough. I used High Yield Med Review and ACCP.....I bought the ACCP 2019 materials and tried to start studying in July 2019, but the material was so in depth, and I was so busy that I kept putting it off and never picked up the study materials again until January of this year. I wasn't going to post because I have been an onlooker on this site throughout my time studying, but it was helpful to see others' testimonies and I wanted to pay it forward. In any case, I am retaking it this Spring and hope I pass. I skipped oncology and skimmed pediatrics (neither of which I have experience with). Make sure to remember and understand biostat like your name. Final thoughts: You will never feel prepared going into this test. A few things... It's my second time taking it but this time I honestly feel like I didn't do better despite studying a lot more. I was leaning towards taking it in the fall to give myself more time. The questions are awesome. A burst of exercise can help you clear your head and get motivated for another round of studying. I like Med101 but I don't think it covers a lot in details. Sitting at a desk for hours can be draining, so make sure to space out time for yourself to get up, stretch or even take a short walk. Studied maybe 3 weeks on and off. And most of all, turn off your phone and avoid using the internet for unrelated tasks to maintain your focus.
